Eligibility Criteria for UPSC Exam

The first step in the process of upsc exam is understanding the eligibility criteria set by the Union Public Service Commission. UPSC Exam Stages

The process of upsc exam is divided into three main stages: Preliminary Examination, Mains Examination, and the Personal Interview (also known as the Personality Test). Each stage is critical and eliminates a portion of candidates to progressively select the best-suited individuals for civil services.

Preliminary Examination

The preliminary exam serves as a screening test and consists of two objective-type papers: General Studies Paper I and General Studies Paper II (also called CSAT). The exam tests the candidates' general awareness, aptitude, and reasoning abilities.

Mains Examination

Those who clear the prelims qualify for the mains, which is a descriptive exam consisting of nine papers. These cover a wide range of subjects including essay writing, general studies, and optional subjects chosen by the candidate. The mains exam assesses in-depth knowledge and analytical skills.

Personal Interview

Candidates who pass the mains are called for a personal interview conducted

by a panel of experts. This stage evaluates the candidate's personality traits, communication skills, and suitability for a career in civil services.

Detailed Syllabus and Exam Pattern

Understanding the syllabus and exam pattern is vital in the process of upsc exam preparation. The syllabus is extensive and covers diverse topics from history, geography, polity, economy, environment, science and technology to ethics and current affairs.

Preliminary Syllabus
